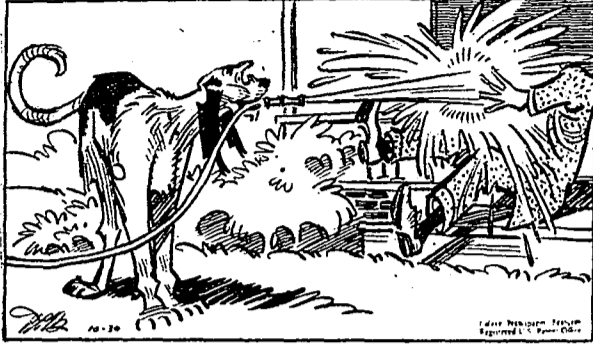
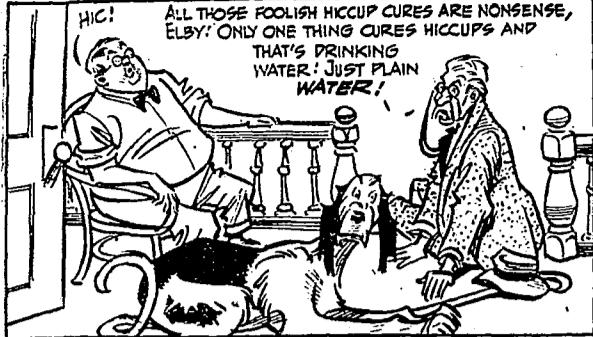

### INTRUDER ON WOMAN FOUND NO APPARITION

BIRMINGHAM, Eng., Oct. 29 (Reuters) — Mrs. Dorothy Inchley thought she was living alone. But every night when she went to bed, there was a filthy, bearded creature crouched within a few feet of her in a yard-wide space under her floorboards.

The other-day the apparition popped out of his hiding place while Mrs. Inchley was doing her housework. He was wearing a pair of her rubber boots.

In court the intruder was identified as Bernard O'Neil, 25, an Irishman from Dublin, who had lived for three weeks like a cave-dweller under Mrs. Inchley's floor without her knowledge. When the woman went to work during the day, Bernard would come out and take over the house. At night he would creep back to his hole. She became suspicious when the bread, milk and butter kept disappearing. More so when the gas and electricity meters were robbed. O'Neil pleaded guilty to robbery charges.

### City Farmers Challenge Country's in Acre Value

New York City District Agriculture Shows High Dollar Yield, Census Bureau Says

WASHINGTON, Oct. 29—The West, Southwest and Middle West will not like it but their leadership in agricultural production is being challenged. On dollar-per-acre yield, that is.

The Bureau of the Census says so officially. To make the fact still more galling, the challenge comes from, of all places, the New York City-Jersey City metropolitan areas, which together already have monopolized leadership in practically every population, economic and housing statistics in the book.

According to the 1950 census, the 15 counties constituting this greatest concentration of the nation's population contains 8387 farms. The total acreage in these farms is 478,908 and their total annual dollar sales of farm products, based on 1949 operations, amounted to \$101,456,428, or an average of \$11,352.40 a farm. The average value per farm in these three metropolitan areas was, in 1949, \$36,781.97.

Efficiency Measure — The Census Bureau accounts for its figures on the basis of dollar production per acre, the real measure of efficiency in agricultural production. It is in this department that the painstaking, clod-by-clod working of limited acres has paid off for the three metropolitan areas.

The farms in the 15 counties involved produced in 1949 an average dollar yield of \$212 an acre. Iowa, which with California leads the nation as a farming State, produced in the same year a yield of \$48 an acre and California, in 1944, produced an average of \$41 an acre.

The census people admit there is an ever-so-slight gimmick in their figuring. That gimmick shows up in the odoriferous Jersey meadows in Hudson County where, as every train rider between Manhattan and Newark knows, thousands of hogs are fattened for the Eastern market.

Called Agricultural — These hogs are considered agriculture production. The hog inventory on Hudson County farms in 1950 was 89,000 and the number of hogs marketed during 1949 was 150,463, compared with 99,145 in 1944. Considering all things, hogs and all, Hudson County produced a dollar yield in 1949 of \$5811 an acre and the report comments that that yield "has probably never been exceeded in the country."

There are 81 farms in Hudson County containing 1027 acres—an average of 12.7 acres to the farm. In 1949 the county produced farm products totaling \$5,967,893, of which \$5,553,171

### Duo Plans Hunt for Noah's Ark

PAU, France, Oct. 29 (Reuters) — A former Antarctic explorer plans to look for Noah's Ark on Mt. Ararat in Turkey. He is Jean de Riquer, a civil service employee. Pierre Claverie, another amateur explorer, will accompany him.

It will be the third attempt in modern times to find the ark. Smith's second bid last year was abandoned because the expedition's goal was too near the Turkish-Russian border.

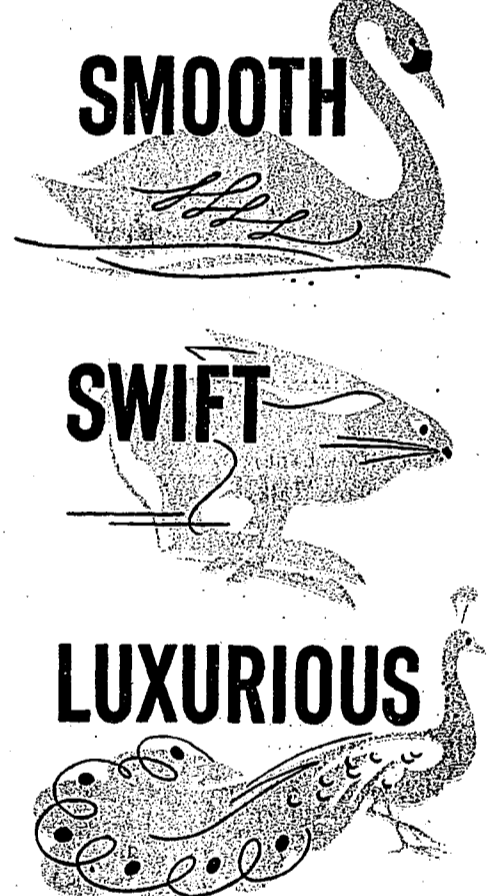
