## 5 States Track Killer Barrow And Aid as 2 More Are Slain

Miami, Okla., April 6 (AP).—Machine guns fired by two gunmen believed by officers to have been Clyde Barrow and Raymond Hamilton, Texas killers, rattled out death again today.

Caught mired in a mudhole, two outlaws shot down Cal Campbell, 63-year-old constable, wounded and kidnaped Percy Boyd, Commerce, Okla., police chief, and sped away, believed accompanied by Barrow's cigar smoking feminine accomplice, Bonnie Parker.

Officers ran down several reports the fugitives had been seen later in the day but did not gain sight of the fast car in which they were riding.

Campbell was felled by a single machine gun bullet in the chest and died almost instantly. By his side was found his revolver, three exploded cartridges showing he had tried to reply to the deadly blast from the outlaws.

Boyd, wounded in the face and shoulder, was forced into the outlaws' car while blood streamed

down his face. An hour later A. N. Butterfield, a farmer who had been forced to help the outlaw car out of a second mudhole, reported the two men boasted of having killed two officers.

This led to fears that perhaps Boyd had died also or had been killed and his body thrown out of the car.

The theory that the killers were not the Barrow gang, but Jim Clark and Frank Delmar, fugitives from the Kansas State Prison at Lansing, was advanced by Perry Porter, Ottawa County attorney. Sheriff Dee Wetters, of Miami, and other officers who took part in the chase, however, held to the belief that the two were Barrow and Hamilton.

Kansas, Missouri, Arkansas and Oklahoma officers armed with machine guns, rifles and shotguns raced over the roads of the Kansas-Oklahoma border country throughout the day, many of them concentrating southwest of Chetopa, Kans., where the outlaw car was reported seen shortly after noon.
